



Driving Directions to Dievole Winery in Tuscany

Plan to arrive at Dievole between **12 noon and 5 pm.**

First consult your map of Italy and get on the major highway (A-1).

- **From the north**, head towards Florence (Firenze). When you reach Florence (no need to enter the city proper) exit the A-1 at **Firenze Certosa** and change to the **Raccordo to Siena**. This is also a major highway and is fairly well marked. Travel south for about 45 minutes, then take the exit marked **Siena Nord**. At the end of the exit will be the local road **SS222**. Turn **LEFT** and proceed **AWAY** from the city of Siena, toward **Castellina in Chianti**.
- **From the south** Take A-1 North to **Sinalunga**, exit and then follow the signs for Siena. You will skirt the city, then follow signs for Florence (Firenze) and **Castellina in Chianti**. Before reaching the highway for Florence, you will turn right onto route **SS222** towards Castellina in Chianti.

After driving a short distance (1 km?) along **SS222** you will see a **RIGHT** turn marked with many signs, one of which should say **Vagliagli** and another for **Dievole**. This road runs right through the heart of the Chianti vineyards. It is a beautiful, though small and winding road. You will follow this for 15-20 minutes toward the little village of Vagliagli. Just **BEFORE** you enter Vagliagli you will see a large, vertical, brass sign for the **Dievole** vineyard on your right. **Turn RIGHT** down this cypress-lined dirt road. After about 1 km you'll notice the yellow inn looming in the distance and a stone ledge with the swallow logo and a large arrow. **Turn RIGHT**, look for the parking lot on your left.

Phone Card: you can buy either an international calling card or the Italian phone card that can be used only in the bright orange Italian public telephones (Sip). At most newsstands or *tabacchi* you can purchase these cards for a pre-determined sum. This might be handy for calling us from the train or bus station. For the SIP card that you use in a pay phone, be sure to rip off the perforated corner before inserting it into the slot on the phone.
